Shelter Services

The Humane Society of Yuma is the only animal shelter in Yuma County. HSOY is an open-admission shelter meaning that no domesticated animal is turned away due to being stray, unwanted or abandoned. The vision of the Humane Society of Yuma is to never euthanize a healthy animal due to space. Through our progressive spay and neuter program and educating the community about pet-overpopulation, HSOY has been able to decrease the amount of animals that have entered our shelter.

Our hope is that with animals being placed into the community that are already spayed or neutered, microchipped and licensed, HSOY and our local animal control partners will help more lost animals find their way home easier. In 2014, only 8% of the animals that entered our shelter found their way home.


The fewer animals that enter our shelter mean that fewer animals are euthanized due to the lack of homes in our community. In 2014, 3,873 animals were euthanized in our shelter. That is a decrease of over 15% from last year. HSOY will continue to be proactive in providing costeffective programs to the community that will allow citizens to spay and neuter their pets and receive proper identification.




Charities ADOPTIONS

Thousands of animals found their forever homes in 2014. HSOY adopted out 2,104 animals. Thanks to



PetSmart Charities, HSOY is able to provide an off-site adoption venue for our adoptable pets. HSOY provides the staff and volunteers to operate the facility while PetSmart Charities provides the kennels, cleaning equipment, and even food for our animals while in their store. In 2014, HSOY adopted out 1,017 animals from our PetSmart location, and 1,087 animals from our main shelter.

New Outreach Program

The Humane Society of Yuma, along with a few of our awesome volunteers, developed a new outreach "Trails and Tails" program in November of 2014. The program was developed to give our shelter guests more exposure out in the community. By taking the pets out of the shelter, people can see them as the loving family pets that they really are, and not just a "pound" puppy or cat. Our dogs can be seen anywhere from hiking up a mountain or hanging out with Santa, to enjoying a sunny patio at our local Starbucks.

Since initiating the program, 24 animals that participated in this program have found their forever homes!!!

Foster Program

During the spring and summer months, it is not unusual for HSOY to receive hundreds of unwanted puppies and kittens. Boxes full of litters arrive at our shelter; many of these babies too young to be adopted or even survive on their own.

Luckily for these babies, our foster program plays an integral role in saving their lives. Foster parents are volunteers that give their time and home to provide the care and nurturing that these animals need to survive. Once these little ones are big enough, they return to the shelter to be spay/neutered and put up for adoption.

Fostering isn't just for babies. Our foster program is also a great resource for animals that enter our shelter sick or injured or just need time to socialize in a "home" environment before moving to the adoption program.





In 2014, 1,255 animals received their second chance through our foster program.


Volunteer Program

HSOY cared for 8,542 animals in 2014 with a staff of 35. It is plain to see that the HSOY wouldn't be nearly as successful without our dedicated volunteers. In 2014, 442 volunteers donated their time and talents to help the homeless pets of Yuma. With their combined efforts, 42,268 hours were donated.




Veterinary Clinic

Our veterinary clinic makes up one of the most important components of our mission. "To reduce the number of homeless pets." The team must not only spay & neuter every animal adopted from our shelter, but it also serves as a low-cost resource to the Yuma community as well.

In 2014, our spay and neuter clinic performed 4,675 surgeries. 2,393 were shelter animals and 2,282 were low-cost and feral surgeries for the community.

The Humane Society of Yuma's Thrift Store was first opened to help subsidize a low-cost spay/neuter clinic here in Yuma. The HSOY Thrift Store originally started at the outdoor swap meet in 2007 and then progressed to our first "4th Ave" location in 2008. In 2014, the store once again moved to its most successful location to date, the Big Curve Shopping Center! The new boutique-like atmosphere at outlet prices has increased our exposure and ultimately our sales! In 2014, the Thrift Store was able to raise \$89,096 towards providing low-cost spay & neuter to the Yuma community.

Rescue Program

On Thursday, September 25th, 2014, the HSOY Rescue team sent out Taylor, a female black Labrador Retriever blend, on a trip with our Rescue Express. All of our pets at the HSOY are very special to us, but what made this sweet girl so special was that she was our 6,000th pet saved through our rescue program.

Taylor was transported to Friends For Life in Gilbert, AZ. (See picture to the left)

Our rescue van's have hauled chickens, rabbits, guinea pigs, parrots, dogs, cats, Pot Belly Pigs, snakes, rats, mice, etc. If it fits in a crate, it gets a ticket to ride the Rescue Express. We are very grateful to our staff, volunteers, and of course our rescue partners for helping us save 1,271 lives this year!



4-Paws Pantry








The 4 Paws Pantry was established in April of 2010 by volunteers of the Humane Society of Yuma (HSOY). The main goal of the program is to keep pets in their homes and from going hungry in the event their families are struggling financially.

100% of the food distributed by the pantry is donated. Spaying and neutering all members' pets is required. This requirement is critical in order to reduce the number of hungry, homeless and abandoned pets.

This year, the 4 Paws Pantry helped a total of 681 members and distributed a total of 26,432 pounds of pet food to the Yuma community.


Distribution Numbers for 2014






